DEAR FRIENDS...

Here we are again, approaching the shortest days of the year and their accompanying lack of sunlight. We are also beginning to feel the cold of winter take over from the mild temperatures of autumn. It is,

however, the lack of light that I would prefer us to think about for the moment. Most of us do not like the dark, it can leave us feeling insecure, anxious, even afraid. Perhaps that's why we spend so much of winter in the northern hemisphere lighting up the world around us. As we have now entered Advent, and will progress through Christmas and Epiphany, we will be lighting up our houses, trees, gardens, and public spaces with a myriad of lights. This is true irrespective of our faith or spirituality. We light up our world with artificial light not just for safety by driving off the literal dark, but we do so also to drive off the metaphorical dark. Today we may not fear the existence of ghouls, ghosts, or scary monsters, yet there is still something of the darkness that unsettles us.

In the Gospel of John, Jesus refers to himself as the 'light of the world'. Rather than a literal light to drive of a literal darkness, Jesus is the metaphorical one who drives off our fears. Not only that, he is the light that lights our path to truth and freedom. With so much chaos and uncertainty in our world we need a light to guide us, all of us, that we may find our way. The light of Christ illuminates our inner selves that we may see our own faults and weaknesses that we may know what we need to address. The light of Christ illuminates the path before us that we may journey towards a life of peace and justice, accomplished by our restoration with God. Once we have experienced the restorative love of God, we cannot keep it to ourselves, we need to share it with others. Once restored we are to be lights so that others, too, may encounter Christ and know what it is to be at one with God.

Christmas will soon be upon us, and we will be singing songs that speak of stars, guiding travellers, and angelic presences both lighting up the sky. As we journey into this celebration let us be the people who light up the world around us, pointing them not towards us but to the Lord Jesus.

May we all know a blessed and light-filled time this Christmas.

ALL IN THE MONTH OF DECEMBER

IT WAS 1,500 YEARS AGO, on 7th December 521 that St Columba, Irish missionary who spread Christianity in Scotland, was born. He was one of the Twelve Apostles of Ireland.

175 YEARS AGO, on 21 December 1846 that the first surgical operation in Europe using anaesthesia took place. Robert Liston amputated a servant's leg at University College Hospital in London.

80 YEARS AGO, on 7th December 1941 that the Japanese made their surprise bomb attack on Pearl Harbour, Hawaii. The USA, UK, Netherlands, New Zealand, and other countries declared war on Japan the following day. The War in Europe had now become a World War.

60 YEARS AGO, on 4th December 1961, that birth control pills became available on the NHS.

30 YEARS AGO, on 25th and 26th December 1991, that Mikhail Gorbachev resigned as President of the Soviet Union, and the next day the Soviet Union was officially dissolved. The 12 remaining Soviet republics became independent states.

25 YEARS AGO, on 10th December 1996, that South African President Nelson Mandela signed a new constitution, completing the transition from white minority rule to full democracy.

20 YEARS AGO, on 13th December 2001, that the Pentagon released a videotape of al-Qaeda leader Osama bin Laden, in which he stated that the deaths and destruction achieved by the 9/11 attacks had exceeded his most optimistic expectations.

15 YEARS AGO, on 30th December 2006, that Saddam Hussein, President/dictator of Iraq (1979 to 2003) was executed for war crimes.

Waiting is not popular in our culture, when so much can be obtained simply at the press of a button! Advent, when we wait for the coming of Christmas, is also an opportunity to learn what it means to be waiting for the promised return of Jesus. He says: 'It's like a man going away: he leaves his house and puts his servants in charge, each with their assigned task, and tells the one at the door to keep watch. Therefore, keep watch because you do not know when the owner of the house will come back' (Mark 13:34-35).

We live between Jesus' first and second comings and this parable reminds us of the need to watch and wait, as disciples living faithfully for Him. It reminds us of two kinds of waiting: passive and active. Imagine you're at the railway station, awaiting the arrival of a train. On the platform a man is asleep, as he thinks there is plenty of time before the train arrives. He is passively waiting. There is also a small boy on the platform who is excited about the train coming. He can't sit still and constantly looks down the track to see if the train is coming. He is actively waiting, for he expects the train to arrive at any moment.

Advent gives us a choice: how will we wait for Jesus' coming? Passive waiting doesn't require much attention on our part. We can live our Christian life pre-occupied with our own concerns,

> rather than looking to God. However, active waiting involves an eager expectation, as we await Jesus' return or simply look to him coming to us today. All we want is to be found faithful as His disciples. There is nothing more important than being ready to meet our Master!

'AND THERE WERE SHEPHERDS...'

Luke's story of the birth of Jesus is brilliantly told - the angel's visit to Mary to tell her she would be mother of the long-promised Messiah, the old priest in the Temple told by another angel that his wife would have a son to be called 'John', who would prepare the people of Israel for that event, and then Mary and Joseph making the 60 mile journey from Nazareth to Bethlehem, as required by the Roman census. When they got there, no room at the inn, and they settled instead for a convenient stable, where Mary gave birth to a boy child.

Suddenly, Luke changes the tone. 'And there were shepherds...' - that's what he actually wrote, just like that. 'And there were shepherds', doing exactly what shepherds do, looking after their flocks by night. But this night was different: yet another angelic message - a call to abandon their sheep and go into Bethlehem to see the baby Messiah. They were given directions and a 'sign' to identify Him. He would be lying in a feeding trough. Well, at least they would recognise that.

And why the shepherds, in this glorious story of our salvation? Because the event needed witnesses, and the chosen witnesses would be this bunch of scruffy, smelly shepherds straight from the sheep-pen. Nothing could speak more eloquently of God's purpose than that. This was not a Saviour for the strong, rich and powerful, but for everybody. The carpenter and his wife guarded the Saviour of the world, and the very first witnesses were not kings or priests but a handful of shepherds.

FINANCE REPORT

NOVEMBER 2021 BOARD REPORT

I'm pleased to report that our finances remain positive and in addition we have had the benefit of a generous legacy. Our financial activity continues to shrink, with income and expenditure still down. However there remains a margin so we should see the close of this financial year significantly in the black. And the good news is that I expect this to be the case after taking account of some building repairs and a resolution to the long standing dispute with Scottish Water regarding our water bills . Small charities benefit from a 100% reduction in water costs; but in a year when we sold investments they deem us not to be small as the sale value is included as income. Illogical, but the legislation appears to support their view.

The generous legacy of £10,000 from our friend and member, Sybil Collier, has now been received.

Further good news is that the rent has continued to come in from Wilton Road and Church House and also that our hall lets are improving now that occupation is allowed, with £3770 for the year to the end of October. Well done - and thank you - to all concerned.

Legacies are a vital pillar of support for both the Reid and the Church of Scotland in general. While lifetime donations, unless restricted to property, organ or another fund, are subject to a portion of about 60% going to Presbytery and 121, this does not apply to legacies - where we benefit from 100% of the bequest.

Fabric Committee are Hazel Melrose, Linda Farrer, Ian Beckett and Stevie Douglas. We could always do with more helpers - we have a big church.

MEETINGS: Last Fabric meeting was 15th September, next meeting 24th November.

WORK PROGRESSED SINCE LAST UPDATE (OCTOBER)

SECURITY: Installation of additional key safe for large hall users. Men's choir window catches secured.

REGULAR INSPECTIONS: Joyce, Ian and Stevie continued to check our buildings to ensure our insurance remained valid and to identify and Fabric issues. Now that the church and halls back to being used 7 days a week, this fortnightly inspection will cease. **HEATING**: Annual maintenance of all three gas central heating boilers undertaken in October. Boilers are in good condition. Large radiator in small hall fixed. Heating now on (autumn settings) covering 5 days of large hall usage, 4 days church usage, 2 days small hall usage and 1 day green room usage

LIGHTING: Time clocks and heating programmes adjusted for changes to BST.

GENERAL: PAT testing completed (Fairshare).

CLOISTER WALLS: Cloister wall coping tiles facing into the garden, surveyed and any loose tiles secured by pin. Still to survey and fix one area of outward facing tiles (no access at time).

MOTHS: Moth specialist engaged and inspected church and offices. No infestation found in church but issues found in office. One application of repellant applied in October, second and last due in December.

GARDENS: Gardens being tidied for Winter. Christmas Tree will be

erected outside with help of 3 local community gentlemen. Tree will be erected in time for Christmas light up event on Sunday 12th at 6pm. **H&S**: Covid regulations and guidance from CoS continue to change allowing Linda to take appropriate positive action for our church. October's Reid Fair Operation risk assessed and enabled. We now have QR code allowing digital track and trace for our church. Sunday checklists updated to cover risks identified in last month's H&S reports. Also track and trace sheets now include coffee. We have assisted 28 external groups with risk assessment and 11 internal RA completed and updated as required.

ONGOING WORK

ROOF: We are investigating a leak in the Tower. Roofers instructed. Church and Hall annual roof maintenance is due next couple of months (roof, gutters, downpipes and lightening rod inspection/ repairs). We have asked our regular roofers to propose an annual maintenance contract for this work.

MANSE WORK: No further update at this time.

CHURCH WIFI: No further progress at this time - lower priority. **LIGHTING**: We will do a review of lighting to create user guides and also gauge whether there are opportunities to reduce our power footprint by replacing bulbs with LEDs.

STRUCTURE: Inspection of potential movement above our south exit door at the back end of the church is still ongoing. As we do not have the technical knowledge whether this significant or not, James Clydesdale has offered his help and expertise.

H&S: Continue to review changing regulations and risk assess hall bookings and events. Looking at how we manage risks associated with 3 days of consecutive Christmas services.

COFFEE AFTER WORSHIP

Being able to serve coffee and tea after the Morning Service has been appreciated by many. I know we have all enjoyed being able to sit and chat after the service. Can I please remind you that we do rely on your donations and the generosity of many of the coffee team members to keep up our supplies of coffee, tea, and biscuits? So please, make a donation on Sundays!

You will have seen that we do need more servers than before with the various restrictions in relation to the corona virus so that we keep everyone as safe as possible. We do need more volunteers to help with the preparation and serving of coffee in the weeks ahead. Can you please consider helping to keep coffee going?

We cannot rely on a very small group of helpers so please get in touch to offer to help.
