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BLINDED BY THE LIGHT

As many of you know, I have spent the last year undergoing a series of operations intended to save my sight.

The procedures are not painful but uncomfortable yet they do have some 'interesting' side effects all of which are very temporary. The last thing you notice is that your perception of colour has radically changed; this lasts but a couple of minutes and causes your vision to tint everything a rather pretty shade of deep pink. Before that, though, you are quite literally blind! It lasts less than one minute but for that time you see nothing but darkness. There is no sunshine, no light and dark, no vague shapes to be seen; nothing. Although used to it now, on the first couple of occasions it was somewhat sobering. When it, and the rose tinted after-effect, have passed you are struck by something else - light. Even on a dull, overcast, day you are struck by the sheer power of sunlight.

The first few weeks after Christmas are known as the season of epiphany. It is a season where we reflect upon the self-revealing of God through Jesus and where many of the readings feature light. This may be the light of the star that guided the magi, or it may be the light that the prophet Isaiah spoke of when he told his people that, 'upon you a great light has shined'. This is not the literal light of lamp or sun but the light of the presence of God. It is not a light that shines only from the outside but one that shines also from within our being. Isaiah tells us that God shines upon us and within us. >

> The light of God lets us see our self as we really are. It is the light that lets us see the path our life should take, and then illuminates our way along it. It is not a light that we are to hold on to like a precious possession; rather, it is a light to be shared. This light we share enables others to live more fully. This light is the words and actions that lead to truth, justice, and hope. It is a light that, metaphorically speaking, we should allow to blind both us and the world.

FAIRTRADE FORTNIGHT 2023

And if that is combined with deeply unfair trade, then communities growing these crops will be pushed to the brink. This makes Fairtrade all the more vital - for all of us.

ALL IN THE MONTH OF **FEBRUARY**

175 YEARS AGO, on 21st Feb 1848 that the Communist Manifesto was published in London. It was written by Karl Marx, with the assistance of Friedrich Engels.

150 YEARS AGO, on 7th Feb 1873 that Thomas Andrews, Irish/British shipbuilder and businessman was born. The naval architect in charge of the plans for the RMS Titanic, he perished along with 1,500 others during her maiden voyage.

100 YEARS AGO, on 16th Feb 1923 that British archaeologist Howard Carter opened the sealed doorway to Tutankhamen's tomb in Thebes, Egypt. The following day he entered the burial chamber and discovered a wealth of treasures.

70 YEARS AGO, on 28th Feb 1953 that British scientists Francis Crick and James D Watson announced that they had discovered the double-helix structure of DNA.

65 YEARS AGO, on 6th Feb 1958 that the Munich air disaster took place. A plane carrying the Manchester United football team ('the Busby Babes'), plus support staff and journalists, crashed while attempting to take off from a slush-covered runway at Munich-Riem Airport. 23 people were killed, including 8 players.

50 YEARS AGO, on 8th Feb 1973 that the US Senate established a select committee to investigate the Watergate scandal. This led to US President Richard Nixon's resignation in August 1974.

40 YEARS AGO, on 8th Feb 1983 that champion racehorse, >

> Shergar, was kidnapped in Ireland and a £2million ransom demanded. The horse was never seen again.

20 YEARS AGO, on 1st Feb 2003 that the US space shuttle Columbia disintegrated over Texas during re-entry, killing all seven astronauts.

10 YEARS AGO, on 1st Feb 2013 that the Shard, a 72-storey skyscraper in London, was officially opened. It is the tallest building in the UK and the sixth tallest in Europe.

REMEMBERING **UKRAINE** ONE YEAR ON



If you would like to mark the first year by helping the people of Ukraine, here are some charities from which you might choose:

FROM THE **ORGAN BENCH**

5th FEBRUARY

ALEXANDRE GUILMANT (1837-1911) was organist of La Trinité in Paris and composed a vast amount of music. He was also at the forefront of the revival in interest in eighteenth century French music and he edited large quantities of it. The Canon and Communion are examples of his many works which were

specifically intended to be played as voluntaries and aimed at the parish church organist with perhaps limited instrumental resources.

IVAN LANGSTROTH (1887 - 1971) was born in California and studied first in San Francisco, then became a pupil in Berlin of Humperdinck, best remembered today for his opera *Hansel and Gretel*. He taught in Vienna, but returned to the United States to teach at Brooklyn College, New York. In his compositions he adopted many of the forms used by German composers, such as Chorale Prelude, Toccata and Fugue. This Interlude was written for the English publisher Novello and treats the well-known Carol tune sung to the words, 'While shepherds watched their flocks by night.'

J S BACH (1685-1750) Among the cornerstones of the organ repertoire are the Preludes and Fugues by J S Bach. This example is written in the 'bright' key of G major, associated in German Baroque music with the mood of celebration. It fills only four landscape pages, but still conveys a sense of breadth and expansiveness. The Chorale Prelude is a bold example of Bach's work in this form and is clearly influenced by the invocation in the title of the chorale, which translates as 'Lord God Holy Ghost'.

MAX REGER (1873 -1916) was the most notable composer working in Germany in the last quarter of the nineteenth century. He wrote in almost every musical form except Symphony and Opera and chamber and instrumental music bulk large, as do songs, but in this country it is for his organ music that he is best known. There are many sets of short pieces grouped together, which can be played singly or as here, as a pair. The *Benedictus* >

> forms part of what is, in effect, an Organ Mass, with other pieces entitled *Kyrie* and *Gloria in Excelsis*. The relevance to this time of year is the idea of 'Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord' and the rhythm of the word Hosanna is made clear in the contrasting middle section. The *Toccata* is a short vigorous piece which also has a brief quiet central section before ending in an overwhelming final cadence.

ALAN SMITH is a contemporary composer who has written a number of pieces designed for players who need repertoire which will suit small village organs, often without pedals. In this instance he has based his composition on Parry's tune which is sung to the words, 'Dear Lord and Father of mankind'.

SIGFRID KARG-ELERT (1877-1933) was a contemporary of Max Reger and also wrote in many forms, but like Reger, is known in Britain almost exclusively for his organ music. His set of 66 *Chorale Improvisations* Op 65 are the most often played, at least in English-speaking countries. However, this *Canzona* is from his 20 *Preludes and Postludes* Op 78, which are less often heard.

GEOFFREY ATKINSON is another contemporary composer who has written music designed for service use. He has skilfully incorporated a number of Scots folk tunes into his compositions and even when not making use of traditional thematic material, his style is recognisably Scottish. The *Prelude* comes from the first of his *Little Liturgical Suites*.

NOEL RAWSTHORNE (1929 - 2019) was Organist of Liverpool Cathedral from 1955 to 1980 and then City Organist based at St George's Hall, Liverpool. He left a small body of original organ music, but was also a skilled transcriber for the organ. The *Sortie*

uses the chorale sung to the words, 'Now thank we all our God' and is in an approachable and extrovert contemporary style.

LOUIS VIERNE (1870 - 1937) was organist of Notre Dame, Paris from 1900 until his death. Prior to his appointment at the cathedral he had been Widor's assistant at St Sulpice. He wrote a large amount of music for his own instrument of the highest quality including six Symphonies and suites of mainly concert pieces. Like most European composers of the period, he took the harmonium seriously as a legitimate expressive instrument, something which did not occur in English-speaking countries. The *Communion* is taken from his last set of pieces for the organ, which Preamble is the first in the first book of Vierne's Pièces en Style Libre for harmonium, although the composer always intended that they should also be played on the pipe organ (*grand orgue*).

J STUART ARCHER (1866 - 1933) was organist of the Third Church of Christ Scientist in London. He was well known as a recitalist and was a prolific composer of both short pieces and concert works. Many were never published, but the *Aria* comes from a pair of pieces entitled *Aria* and *Allegro*, which were published in 1945.

CHURCH LEADERS PROTEST OVER CUMBRIAN MINE

More than 450 church leaders and Christian campaigners have recently signed an open letter to the Prime Minister, calling for a reversal on the Government's decision to open a new coal mine in Cumbria. "Coal from this mine will continue to heat up the planet, pollute the atmosphere and most severely impact those in the world's poorest countries who have done the least to cause the climate crisis."

It is a great opportunity to establish a relationship that leads to developing social contacts & interactions to encourage people to connect back into the community. Passing the Baton volunteers are required to be rooted in the Christian faith, so your congregations and communities are the best place for the befrienders to come from.
