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GREETINGS FROM ALEX IN SUNNY LISBON



We arrived safely at the beginning of May to rather cold and grey weather.

Thankfully, the weather has changed for the better and we have been walking, and cycling, visiting some of our favourite places.

On Sunday we were welcomed back by some familiar and friendly faces of St Andrew's Church of Scotland. There has been a worshipping community here for over 150 years. In 1844 there was an evangelistic outreach in Madeira led by Dr Robert Kalley, known as The Wolf from Scotland. The new church was persecuted by the Madeiran authorities. The religious tension between the new Presbyterians and the local, traditionally Catholic, community resulted in the burning of the Kalley home in 1846. He and his wife fled to the United States and 2000 Portuguese were expelled from the island by the authorities. The Rev. Lewiston was later sent to Lisbon to care for the spiritual well-being of the Scots who were living there, and so the church began. The last full time minister of St Andrews was the Rev. Graham McGeoch who after some years of ministry was called and served a congregation in Edinburgh before leaving with his Brazilian wife to minister in Brazil. Since that time St Andrews has been served by many Locums who come for periods of three months or more. The congregation is small in number, on Sunday there were twenty seven in attendance. The church is under the 'Guardianship' of the Presbytery of Europe which in essence means that they are not allowed to call a minister until attendances improve.

I remember my first Sunday here; I had left a very full congregation on my farewell service from Blackhall St Columba and came to Lisbon to find eight people in attendance. There was no Session Clerk, Treasurer, and Presbytery Elder but fortunately things began to improve. By the time I left the numbers had risen to around twenty to thirty and we had managed to get people to fill these important roles. Those who are members are not only British expats, but from all around the globe. They are English speaking, who have come to Lisbon from Hungary, Sweden, Hong Kong, South Africa, Nepal and the USA. Various holiday makers from all over join the congregation from time to time and are always made very welcome. Each of the members has his or her own special story to tell as to why they came to Lisbon and of course like most congregations there are those with difficulties and problems and long to be listened to and cared for. After the service a buffet lunch is served with wine and coffee.

Above all what holds them together is their love for Christ and the things of Christ. The service itself is quite traditional and very much like the service in any

Church of Scotland back home. We are all part of the one church worldwide and I often think that in the words of the hymn, 'The church is wherever God's people are praising'. If you should ever visit Lisbon you can be assured of a very warm reception in similar manner to that of our own congregation. I believe that it is good to remember that we are all one in Christ Jesus, part of God's family, wherever we worship whether it be in Reid or St Andrews we are all brothers and sisters in Christ.

Jill and I look forward to returning to Reid in the beginning of August. We do miss you and pray God's richest blessing upon you. Till we meet again have a good summer and may the sun continue to shine upon you as it does upon us here. Every blessing, **ALEX**

ALL IN THE MONTH OF JUNE

150 YEARS AGO, on 7th June 1868 that Charles Rennie Mackintosh, Scottish architect, artist and designer, was born. He was prominent in the Arts and Crafts movement and influenced European design movements such as Art Nouveau and Secessionism.

125 YEARS AGO, on 7th June 1893 that Mahatma Gandhi committed his first act of civil disobedience while working as a lawyer in South Africa. He refused to comply with racial segregation rules which prohibited coloured people from travelling first class on trains. He refused to leave a first-class carriage and was thrown off the train in Pietermaritzburg. (After protesting, he was allowed on the following day's train.)

90 YEARS AGO, on 14th June 1928, that Emmeline Pankhurst, British political activist died. She was leader of the British suffragette movement.

65 YEARS AGO, on 2nd June 1953, that the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II at Westminster Abbey, London took place. (This was also the first event where the British TV audience was greater than the radio audience.)

50 YEARS AGO, on 6th June 1968 that Robert Kennedy, American politician was shot and killed. A Senator from New York, and former Attorney General, he was shot in Los Angeles while campaigning for the presidential nomination. Brother to US President John F Kennedy.

40 YEARS AGO, on 19th June 1978 that British cricketer Ian Botham became the first player in history to score a century and take eight wickets in a single Test match. (In the Second Test against Pakistan at Lord's Cricket Ground.)

30 YEARS AGO, on 11th June 1988 that Nelson Mandela's 70th Birthday Tribute took place at Wembley Stadium, and was broadcast to a worldwide audience of 600 million. Mandela was still in prison, and not released until February 1990. (His actual birthday was 18th July.)

15 YEARS AGO, on 20th June 2003 that the Wikimedia Foundation was founded in Florida. The non-profit charitable organisation operates several websites, including the popular online encyclopaedia Wikipedia.

REMEMBRANCE 100

MARKING THE END OF THE FIRST WORLD WAR

On Sunday, 4th August 1918 King George V and Queen Mary joined members of the House of Commons and the House of Lords for a special service at the Church of Saint Margaret, Westminster. The King had asked that 4th August 1918, the fourth anniversary of the declaration of war, should be observed as a National Day of Prayer. One hundred days later the war ended.

Remembrance100 has been set up by HOPE, a UK Christian mission charity, in partnership with Christian denominations and ministries, including military chaplaincies, to help churches bring communities together to mark the centenary of the end of the first World War.

On 4th August 2018 churches across the country will start 100 days of prayer, peace and reconciliation. Church leaders, Christian charities, chaplaincies and ministries from Britain and the Commonwealth are providing prayers and suggestions for peace-making activities to be included in a book called 100 Days of Peace and Hope for Remembrance100, as this season is being called. The book can be used by individuals, churches and schools.

HOPE is also publishing a commemorative booklet called Silence for churches to give away at Remembrance Services.

Here are a few key dates:

4th AUGUST: this will be the first day of 100 days of prayer, running until Armistice Day in November. The book 100 Days of Peace and HOPE will be available from Remembrance100, with daily prayers and thoughts, plus peace-making ideas for communities to use each weekend.

21st SEPTEMBER: the United Nations International Day of Peace and the launch of 2018 Peace Awards.

5-9th NOVEMBER: schools will mark a week of peace before the Remembrance weekend.

11th NOVEMBER: there will be Remembrance Services around the Commonwealth. Many will be followed by Peace Parties.

DECEMBER: Peace Awards ceremonies will be held.

Response Pastors are a group of Scottish Street Pastors who have received additional training to enable them to offer a listening ear and to help and care in the event of a natural or manmade disaster. This group of about 40 people are from all over Scotland and have very varied skills and talents. We are widely spread all over Scotland which would allow us to have a team at the scene of a disaster very quickly. Response Pastors have been in existence in England for some time and have been called upon to attend tragic events such as the Manchester Arena bombing and the Grenfell Tower fire.

I am the Scottish Coordinator and I will receive the call on a dedicated mobile phone from the Scottish Resilience and Rescue Team in the event of a disaster in Scotland and possibly the north of England. It will be my responsibility to draw teams from our group to attend, as and when appropriate. We will work in shifts to ensure our own wellbeing and maximise the help that we can offer people that are caught up in the tragic events. As a result I need to have the mobile phone with me at all times and of course, it must be switched on. It will even be on while I'm in Church; it's loud with a distinct ring and will probably cause me to panic initially and then run out of the service!! I hope that you will pray, as I do, that we will never be called. 

BASICS BANK (BB)

The BB is still going strong and currently we have around 12 clients, with a few families of 2 and 3 children. So you can imagine that our wee stock of tins and packets reduce fairly quickly! Currently we have a few clients who don't have proper cooking facilities - just a kettle - so items like noodles, couscous, cup-a-soup, tinned meat, tinned fish and tinned fruit are always needed.

At the moment we are very short of the following, which are listed in order of priority: **pasta** (but not spaghetti please), **pasta sauce**, **toilet paper**, **shower gel**, **tinned fruit**, **noodles**, **tinned carrots**, **Tinned fish**, **tinned tomatoes**, **tinned baked beans**, **cereal** (but no porridge please), **deodorant** (M/F), **lentils**, **Cup-a-Soup**. If you can help with just one or two of these items it would be greatly appreciated, as will be your prayers for all our clients and helpers.

If you would prefer to give a monetary donation to buy essential items, that would be fine. Just pop it into an envelope, seal it and hand it to me at the church on a Sunday and I'll pass it on.

I would like to end on a bit of good news! Recently the local Sainsbury's, under their Food Donation Partnership, have chosen our Basics Bank as their chosen charity - so any items that customers put into their box will come to our BB at the Kings Hall in South Clerk Street.

FROM THE ORGAN BENCH

Harold Darke (1888–1976) was organist of St Michael's Church, Cornhill in the City of London and was pupil at the Royal College of Music of Charles Stanford for composition and Walter Parratt for organ playing. His compositions incline more towards the meditative rather than the dramatic and his Prelude on a Theme by Thomas Tallis is one of a set of three.

Alexandre Guilmant (1837–1911) was a noted recitalist and teacher based in Paris and had an enormous influence on organ playing through his teaching and compositions. He wrote many short pieces as well as eight Sonatas for organ, two of them also exist in versions for organ and orchestra. The Canon in B flat is entirely unpretentious and was written to provide good quality music for service use within the reach of the average church player.

William Faulkes (1863–1933) lived and died in Liverpool where he was organist of St Margaret's Church, Anfield for over fifty years. He published over five hundred compositions and left a further three hundred in manuscript to Liverpool library. His Sonata in D minor treats the hymn tune 'Leoni', which is sung in this country to the words, 'The God of Abraham Praise'.

Louis Vierne (1870–1937) was organist of La Notre Dame, Paris and in addition to writing the organ music for which he is best known outside France, he also wrote chamber music, a symphony and songs. All three pieces of the Triptyque are quiet and reflective and make use of the quieter register of the organ.

Theodore Dubois (1837–1924) succeeded Camille Saint-Saëns as organist of La Madeleine, one of the most fashionable churches in late nineteenth-century Paris. He wrote many pieces including motets, oratorios and works for the stage, but it is his organ music that remains best known. The present piece is in the form of typical French postlude designed to be played at the end of mass.

Max Reger (1873–1916) was a German mainstream composer whose entire output is still very highly regarded in Germany. In Europe and America it is his organ music that is best known. Although he wrote many pieces which require a virtuoso technique, there are many sets of short pieces which are equally suitable for recitals or use in the context of a service. This brief Intermezzo is one such example.

Charles Villiers Stanford (1852–1924) was a notable teacher of composition at the Royal College of Music had an enormous influence on British music in the first half of the twentieth century. He wrote a great deal in all forms and left much very fine music that should be better known. His organ and church music have never suffered neglect and this example is a piece based on a hymn by his friend and colleague C. H. H. Parry, who was the Director of the Royal College at this time. The tune 'Intercessor' is in the current hymn book, set to the words 'Spirit of God, in all that's true, I know you'.

Basil Harwood (1859–1949) was organist of Trinity College, Oxford, Ely Cathedral and Christ Church Oxford, retiring at the age of fifty to manage the family estates in Gloucestershire. However, he continued composing until the age of eight-seven. His organ works vary from demanding recital pieces to quiet voluntaries of which the present instance is a good example.

Craig Sellar Lang (1891–1971) was another pupil of Sir Charles Stanford and became director of music at Christ's Hospital, Horsham from 1929 to 1945. He retired to concentrate on composition and examining. The Tuba Tune remains his best-known piece, although in later life he came to feel rather ashamed of it. However, it has kept its place in the repertoire and it is still a pleasure to hear it from time to time.

WORLD CUP FEVER

The former Liverpool Manager Bill Shankly famously said, 'Some people believe football is a matter of life and death, I am very disappointed with that attitude. I can assure you it is much, much more important than that!'

This month sees the start of the World Cup in Russia; a truly global event watched by billions on television. Yet this competition illustrates some key points about the Christian life. As Paul writes: 'But one thing I do: forgetting what is behind and straining towards what is ahead, I press on towards the goal to win the prize for which God has called me heavenwards in Christ Jesus.' (Philippians 3:13b,14).

A prize to be won: the dream of every player in the competition is to be able to hold up the World Cup themselves. For us the prize is the eternal life, God's gift of relationship with him for now and eternity through Jesus. But there's an important difference between football and the Christian faith. To win the World Cup you have to be good enough, while Christ's love for us is underserved and is not dependent on how well we've done.

Training to be undertaken: if a team is going to win the World Cup, they have to train hard beforehand. Our training, as Christians, starts the moment we accept the gift of God's life. On a daily basis, we train ourselves to say no to the wrong things in our lives. As we build up our godly muscles we are better able to choose to do what is right in God's eyes. To enable us to do all this we need to engage in the spiritual disciplines of prayer, studying the Bible and being part of a church and small group. How is your training going?



USE YOUR LOAF

It takes a year to produce a loaf of bread, from field to fork. Yet in the UK we throw away 24 million slices of it, every day. The average person will throw away more than half a loaf of bread every month. A recent survey by Love Food Hate Waste has also found that among 18 to 34-year-olds, 69 per cent throw bread away every week. The campaign is urging people to slice and freeze their bread when they get it home, so that it can last for several months.

VACANCY UPDATE
