Have you ever noticed how often when something is said what we hear is rather different? I don't mean in the sense of 'Chinese

Whispers', where the request to "send reinforcements, we're going to advance" eventually reaches HQ as "send three-and fourpence, we're going to a dance". Rather, I mean where the message is so confused or indistinct that it is not clear, and so becomes misheard.

In the church where so much is changing, just as in the remainder of the world, communication becomes important. Clear communication becomes vital. It will help us see the challenges ahead. It will help us discern the path that we must tread. A week before I wrote this piece we met as a congregation on the Lord's Day; we met to worship, to share in fellowship, and to discuss the Presbytery's Proposals for our congregation. There were a great number of messages, thoughts, and feelings shared that day. It could have led to nothing more than further worries or confusion, however one clear thing stood out. There was one message that was loud and clear, giving shape and purpose to who we are. The message was this: we are family.

The sense of being family, as a part of something bigger and natural, is central to the Scriptures. Throughout their story of salvation, we see many great individuals, yet it is more than this the story of a community. Scripture tells the story of the family of God. As disciples of Jesus, we are a part of that great story. In the

challenges and confusion of the times ahead of us this becomes one thing we can hold on to almost as an anchor in the storm. Psalm 133 also tells us that this sense of family, of unity in God, is also a place of blessing. In other words, it is more than an anchor. Being a part of the family of God becomes a way of hope. Moving forward we need to hold on to that.

Sermon

When a minister rehearses his sermon, is he practising what he preaches?

IT WAS 500 YEARS AGO, from 9th to 17th March 1522 that Martin Luther preached his *Invocavit* Sermons. He urged citizens to adhere to the core Christian values and trust in God, rather than using violence to bring about change.

175 YEARS AGO, on 3rd March 1847 that Alexander Graham Bell, Scottish-born American engineer, and scientist, was born. Credited with inventing the first practical telephone.

100 YEARS AGO, on 10th March 1922 that Indian independence leader Mahatma Gandhi was arrested and charged with sedition for his campaign of non-cooperation against the British Indian government. He was sentenced to six years in prison but released after two years as he needed surgery.

80 YEARS AGO, on 8th March 1942 that the bombing of Essen, Germany, took place. It was the first attack on a German city by the British RAF following the Area Bombing Directive of 14th February, which authorised the bombing of civilian areas.

75 YEARS AGO, on 1st March 1947 that the International Monetary Fund began operating.

65 YEARS AGO, on 25th March 1957 that the Treaty of Rome was signed, creating the European Economic Community (EEC) which came into force on 1st January 1958. It was renamed the European Community in 1993 and dissolved in 2009, having been replaced by the European Union.

50 YEARS AGO, on 24th March 1972 that the government of Northern Ireland resigned, and on 30th March 1972 that the

British government introduced direct rule of Northern Ireland from Westminster (until 1999).

25 YEARS AGO, on 6th March 1997 that Queen Elizabeth launched the official Royal website: www.royal.gov.uk
Also 25 YEARS AGO, on 21st March 1997 that the Rev W V Awdry, British clergyman and children's writer, died. Best known as the creator of Thomas the Tank Engine.

APPEAL FOR UKRAINE


The intense conflict in Ukraine has brought misery and threat to the lives of civilians across the country, and its neighbours, with over a million people already having fled their homes to escape.

WORLD WATCH LIST FOR 2022

NAMES WORST 50 COUNTRIES

Afghanistan is now the worst country in the world for the extreme persecution of Christians.

So says Open Doors, which has recently released the 2022 World Watch List, its annual ranking of the top 50 countries where Christians face the most extreme persecution.

For 2022, Afghanistan comes top because the Taliban are back in control. North Korea now comes second, followed by Somalia, Libya, Yemen, Eritrea, Nigeria, Pakistan, Iran, and India in the top ten. >

> But the problem is worldwide. "At least 360 million Christians around the world experience high levels of persecution and discrimination," says Open Doors. "That's an astonishing one in seven of the global Christian population.

"Persecution of Christians has reached the highest levels since the Open Doors World Watch List began nearly 30 years ago."

And Open Doors warns that the Taliban victory in Afghanistan has "bolstered Islamic militants in neighbouring Pakistan and may well embolden jihadist groups in other regions. The Taliban's success encourages extremists around the world."

Certainly, Christians across sub-Saharan Africa also face increasing violence from Islamic militants. In Nigeria, more Christians are killed for their faith than in the rest of the world combined. But they are also badly persecuted in Mozambique, the Democratic Republic of Congo, Central African Republic, Mali, Cameroon, and Burkina Faso.

Meanwhile, the global Church is increasingly a refugee church, because of the more than 84 million people around the world who have been forcibly displaced and are living as refugees in another country or displaced within their own country, many are Christians fleeing persecution.

Open Doors says, "Sadly, life on the move or in refugee camps is even more fragile, with discrimination, extortion, human trafficking and sexual violence. A displaced church is a vulnerable church." Open Doors partners work with refugees in many countries, providing vital aid, shelter, and fellowship to Christians in need. SCOTLAND CENSUS 2022

Scotland's Census is the official count of every person and household in the country.

It usually takes place every 10 years. The census asks questions about people's age, sex, home and living situation, employment, education, and qualifications, as well as ethnicity. Every household in Scotland must complete the census and, by doing so, are helping to shape Scotland's future.

Completing the census is important because the answers provide the Scottish Government and many other service providers with the data they need to make important decisions that affect people's lives and their communities. These decisions include how money will be spent on important services like education, housing, healthcare, roads, and railways, and so much more.

From the end of February, households will begin to receive a letter with instructions on how to complete their census online.

Census Day is 20th March, but you can fill it in as soon as you receive your letter. Just make sure you answer questions with information that will be correct on 20th March to ensure that we have a snapshot of the nation on this day.

The Fourth Sunday in Lent was called 'Mid-Lent' or 'Refreshment Sunday', when the rigours of Lent were relaxed more than was normal for a feast day. It is called Mothering Sunday as a reference to the Epistle reading for the Day (Galatians 4:21-31). The Lenten Epistles follow from each other with teaching about our life as Christians and how we are to follow Christ.

On Mid-Lent Sunday the Epistle talks of bondage and freedom; the bondage of the Law and the Old Covenant as compared to the freedom in Christ, "the promised one", and the New Covenant. Verse 26 reads "But Jerusalem which is above is free, which is the mother of us all." We gain our freedom from Christ and, as it was seen before the Reformation, the Church.

Thus, Mothering Sunday is about the freedom that we gain through the promise of Jesus Christ delivered through our Mother the Church. People were encouraged to go to their 'Mother Church' (their home church or their home Cathedral) to worship and give thanks. Hence apprentices, and others, went home for the weekend and often brought gifts (or accumulated pay) home to their family.

On the other hand, Mother's Day is a secular festival invented in 1904 and is celebrated on the 2nd Sunday in May in most countries in the world. The UK seems to be the exception. In recent years Mothering Sunday has been hijacked to take the place of a special, secular day to give thanks for our mothers.

ORIGIN OF THE YELLOW RIBBON

We are loved with everlasting love! One of the greatest and most comforting doctrines taught in the Bible is the love of God for His people. John emphasises the great truth in a magnificent creed of just three words: 'God is love' (1 John 4:8). Quite simply there is nothing in all creation more reassuring, more comforting, more encouraging, more uplifting than to know that God loves us. And we can go further and put it in personal terms as Paul did. 'He loved me and gave Himself for me' (Galatians 2:21).

How can we illustrate the illimitable love of God? One such illustration was told by the Rev John Wilbur Chapman of Indiana, an ordained Presbyterian minister who in 1893 went into full-time evangelistic ministry.

One evening Chapman was travelling by train in a rural part of Kansas. The other passenger in the carriage was a young man >

> who kept glancing out the window and then covering his face with his hands. Chapman asked if he could help.

The young man confessed that many years before he had run away from home and 'sown his wild oats.' He had not written to his parents at all, until a few weeks before, telling them that he would be travelling on this train. At a certain point it passed very close to his home. In the letter he had begged his parents' forgiveness and asked if they wanted him to come home. If so, they were to tie a yellow ribbon on the old apple tree that grew right beside the railway lines.

"Sir," he said to Chapman, "the train will soon pass my home but I'm afraid to look. If there's a yellow ribbon on the tree, I'll get off at the next station and go home. If there's no ribbon, I'll just travel on. But I'm too afraid to look out for the tree." So, Chapman offered to look for him.

"You can open your eyes now," he said a few minutes later. The returning prodigal looked at Chapman with tears and quivering lips. 'All is well,' said the evangelist. 'There is a yellow ribbon on the apple tree. In fact, there's far more than one. Every branch is hanging with yellow ribbons, scores, and scores of them. Your parents love you that much, they want you to come home." If parents can love their wayward children like that, how much greater is the love of God! Truly, we are loved with everlasting love.
