Do you remember, as a child, being taught to sing, 'The Animals Went in Two by Two'? Although intended to say something about Noah and the flood as

recorded in Genesis it also says something else that is, perhaps, less obvious. What is less obvious is that there are animals in the song that wouldn't normally be seen together. Yet, that idea is not totally unusual in Scripture. In a number of places it speaks of such strange sights, including that of the "lion laying down with the lamb". So what is this about, and what is its relevance to us?

We live in a time when we see clearly that our world is in danger. Due to nature and human activity habitats are slowly being destroyed, and the environment is becoming more widely polluted. We read of both global warming and rising sea levels, coupled to the melting of the ice-caps. Yet the Scriptures point to a time when nature is healed and restored to what it once was. This isn't some fantasy or dream but a looking forward to the return of Christ Jesus and the world being redeemed. So often we think of redemption as applying only to mankind, however the Bible makes it clear that all of creation is within the plan of God.

The Bible teaches us that we are called to be stewards of the earth. That means careful nurture of our environment and the many species that share this planet with us. Yes, we may await a new "heaven and a new earth" but we have the current one to look after as we do so. From September 1st through to October 4th is now >

> regarded as Creation-tide within the church. It is a time for us to work together to consider God's creation and our role in nurturing it.

The animals in the song went in two by two to get out of the rain. Let's come together to seek ways to tend to nature not that the animals may go two by two but that the ark will no longer be necessary. Let's work together to bring something of Eden into play during our lives.

ALL IN THE MONTH OF OCTOBER

125 YEARS AGO, on 3rd Oct 1896 that William Morris, British textile designer, pot novelist and socialist, died. Best known for his association with the Arts and Crafts Movement.

80 YEARS AGO, from 2nd Oct 1941 to 7th Jan 1942 that the Battle of Moscow took place. Nazi Germany launched a massive offensive against the Soviet capital. It was one of the largest and most important battles of World War II. Soviet victory.

75 YEARS AGO, on 1st Oct 1946 that the International War Crimes Tribunal in Nuremberg ended. 12 Nazi leaders were sentenced to death for war crimes committed during WWII. 10 of them were hanged on 16th October. Hermann Goering committed suicide the night before he was to be hanged.

70 YEARS AGO, from 15th to 17th Oct 1951 that the first party election broadcasts were televised in the UK. The three main parties, Liberal, Conservative and Labour, were allocated 15 minutes each.

ALSO 70 YEARS AGO, on 18th Oct 1951that Snowdonia National Park was established in Wales.

ALSO 70 YEARS AGO, on 30th Oct 1951 that Dartmoor National Park was established.

ALSO 70 YEARS AGO, on 31st Oct 1951, that zebra crossings were introduced in the UK. The first one was in Slough, Berks.

60 YEARS AGO, on 6th Oct 1961 that US President John F Kennedy advised Americans to build bomb shelters to protect themselves from nuclear fallout in the event of an attack by the Soviet Union. >

- > **50 YEARS AGO**, on 1st Oct 1971 that the first CT scan was performed on a patient at Atkinson Morley Hospital in Wimbledon.
- **40 YEARS AGO**, on 3rd Oct 1981 that a hunger strike by IRA members in Maze Prison, County Down, ended after seven months. 10 prisoners had died.
- **25 YEARS AGO**, on 18th Oct 1996 that the journal Science published the first study that showed a causal link between a toxin found in tobacco smoke and the development of lung cancer.
- **20 YEARS AGO**, on 7th Oct 2001, that the first US and British forces arrived in Afghanistan to launch a massive military offensive following the 9/11 terrorist attack.
- **10 YEARS AGO**, on 20th Oct 2011, that Muammar Gaddafi, head of state of Libya (1969-2011) was captured and killed by military from the National Transitional Council.

PERSECUTION OF CHRISTIANS SET TO RISE IN AFGHANISTAN

As the Taliban tighten their grip on Afghanistan, Release International has warned that attacks on Christians are likely to rise across the region.

One church leader in Afghanistan said Christians were living in great fear. Some who worked for the government now face reprisals, and any identified as Christians could be killed. Christians risk betrayal, even from their own family members.

A Christian contact of one Release International partner describes the situation as 'dire.' Says 'Micah': "Our brothers and sisters in Christ are telling us how afraid they are. In the areas that the Taliban now control girls are not allowed to go to school and women are not allowed to leave their homes without a male companion."

The church in Afghanistan already faced sharp persecution, even before the Taliban advance. That church is invisible and must operate underground in this land where Muslims who change their faith are breaking the law and considered to have betrayed their communities.

To be exposed as a Christian is to risk being charged with apostasy, which is punishable by death or imprisonment. There have also been honour killings of Christians by their families.

One of the communities worst affected by the Taliban is the Shia Hazara minority, which has been especially responsive to the Christian message. > > In May 2021, the Taliban bombed the Sayed Ul-Shuhada High School in Kabul, killing at least 85, mainly schoolgirls. The previous year the Taliban staged a shooting at a maternity clinic, killing women, children, and babies.

It was the Pakistan Taliban who shot 15-year-old Malala Yousafzai for going to school and telling the world about it in a blog.

Thousands of Afghans, including Christians, are now seeking refuge in neighbouring Pakistan. But the Taliban are growing in influence there, too. Before the Afghan president fled, he accused Pakistan of permitting thousands of jihadi fighters to cross its border to support the Taliban.

Through its international network of missions, **Release International** is active in some 25 countries around the world, supporting pastors, Christian prisoners and their families.

Throughout the month, you'll see leaflets for Blythswood in the church - please take one and follow the simple check-list in it if you would like to fill a shoebox, (or a drawstring bag). Here's some suggestions for essentials you might pack: • toothbrush and toothpaste • hat, scarf, gloves • soap • underwear, socks, tights • small toys for boys and girls such as cars, dolls, balls (should be new shop-bought toys). • Sweets (no chocolate or any other food) with a Best Before date no earlier than March 2022. 27A EDINBURGH GUIDE COMPANY

As the 27A Company is about to change its Leaders, this seems like a good moment to give a short account of its 85 years of existence so far!!

When the Reid Memorial Church opened in 1936, the 27A Guide Company began its life. One of the very first Guides to be enrolled was a certain Dorothy Polson, who later became Dorothy Donaldson.

After her time in Guides Dorothy went on to Cadets, which was for those who wanted to become Guiders (as opposed to Land, Sea or Air Rangers who just wanted to have fun, but often did become Guiders anyway!). There were 5 Guiders over the years to 1943, at which point a still very young Dorothy took over the company, going on to be Unit Guider for the next 29 years. In that time her Assistant Guiders included Sylvia Ritchie (Wood Hawkes), Edythe Birrell, Ruth Liggat, Alison Purkins (Reid) and Judith Smeaton (Liggat), all members of the Reid.

The Company camped from the early years and Marjorie Longmore (Nish), Mary Clarkson (Brown) and Sylvia remember going to camp in the late 1940s, travelling in the back of a removal van. This was a fun way to travel, and we were all disappointed when safety issues brought the tradition to an end in 1983! A bus for the Guides and a van for the equipment isn't quite the same.

In 1972, Alison and Judith took up the reins and camping >

> continued to be a major part of the Company's activities. With the exception of 1978, summer week-long camp was the highlight of the year right up to 2019.

Over the years so much changed, though cooking on an open wood fire was constant. Food deliveries of meat, milk, groceries were initially by individual suppliers, then became massive precamp shopping trips to a supermarket the day before, to finally be on-line deliveries to the site. Daily potato peeling was often replaced by rice or pasta. Steamed puddings came out of tins, instead of starting life as individual ingredients and needing hours of cooking. Camp clothing went from heavy school gaberdines that never dried once they got wet, to plastic raincoats that got torn and ended up held together with Sellotape, to light nylon cagoules and trousers. Singing round a real campfire (with or without midges!), days out (with the excitement of swimming and getting a shower and hair wash!), inspection and the intense competition that could produce, challenges and badge work. So many memories.

In 2012, Linda Banks (Bain) became Unit Guider, having been helping Alison since 1983!! She, Morag Samuel (Purkins) and Jennifer Embleton continued the camping traditions until Covid stopped play in 2020.

Throughout all these years, small groups of 5 - 7 Guides did weekend Patrol Camps at Netherurd, Trefoil or Carsewell. With this amount of camping experience, it was possible to run an annual week-long summer camp each year and latterly 27A were the only Edinburgh company that were keeping up this tradition. So many good friendships were made at camp, and it was from getting to know each other better that girls were able to enjoy meetings so much more.

Over the years there have been many changes: "new">

> Promise and Law, "new" programmes, "new" handbooks. Now it is new leaders. The loss of camping opportunities and the knock-on effect, another new programme requiring increased paperwork, living at considerable distances from the Church and ever-increasing commuting times - these have all combined to make Linda, Morag and Jen decide that this is the right time to move on. We are very grateful to them for all the time and effort that they have put in over many years - about 90 between them!!

We wish the new leaders well as 27A enters a new phase.
